DEVELOPMENT OF CYCLING ON TOWING PATHS

IWA have recently issued two press releases about cycling and towing paths. The first on 2nd March:

The IWA reaffirmed today that it is opposed to a major extension of cycling on towing paths as recently proposed in a joint statement by BW and the cycling organisation, etc. IWA believes that any suggestion of converting the whole network of towing paths to cycleways would be impractical and damaging to the waterways and their present uses. IWA does, however, believe that BW should be obtaining funding from the Government's 'green transport' budget as well as its existing maintenance grant-in-aid.

BW have proposed to the Government that they be granted £158 million of public money to convert all 2,900 kms of their waterway towing paths to cycling routes within 7 years. They have also asked for a further £4.6 million per annum for increased maintenance costs. These proposals are contained in BW's response to the Dept of the Environment, Transport and the Region's consultation on Developing an Integrated Transport Policy.

BW have also issued a joint statement with ctc which claims that towing paths are a major transport network and suggests that funding should come from an increase in tax on motor vehicles. However, it is the waterways which are the transport network and towing paths are merely there for local access. Proposals by Sustrans for

the widespread conversion of towing paths to cycle routes have been much reduced in view of the many practical difficulties involved and the opposition to major structural changes to the heritage of the waterways.

IWA supports the present level of cycling on towing paths for working locks, access to boats, safety and low level recreational cycling for people who are using the towing paths because they appreciate the waterway setting. IWA does not support the expansion of towing paths into cycleways as an alternative to roads for cycling commuters. There are some urban sections of canals and navigable rivers where sufficiently wide pathways can be created without detriment to the waterway landscape, but proper consultation is needed with all existing users before such changes are made.

IWA National Chairman, Mrs Audrey Smith, said "IWA will continue to campaign against the wholesale conversion of waterway towing paths into hard surfaced, high speed commuting racetracks which would damage the amenity and threaten the safety of walkers, anglers and boat crews."

Mrs Smith added, "We are very concerned that BW have issued a Joint Statement with ctc proposing a major change to the waterway environment without any consultation with the user groups who would be directly affected by such change. In their response to the Government's Integrated Transport Policy initiative, BW have claimed that much of the waterway network could be adapted for safe, economic and sustainable cycling by purchase of additional land or construction at different levels. We believe that BW have not properly considered the devastating effect this would have on the unique environment of our waterways which is the nation's irreplaceable heritage."

The second press release was issued on 21st March:

IWA & BW are agreed that BW should continue its plans to involve national user groups and cycling organisations to develop and define safe and sustainable levels for the management of cycling on the towing path.

BW and IWA agreed the following key points:

- Any proposals for accommodating increased cycling use of towing paths will be developed for individual sections according to local needs and the physical characteristics of the waterway corridor.
- There will be full local consultation on proposals to convert sections of towing paths to cycle routes,

March Meeting

The Somersetshire Coal Canal was authorised by Act of Parliament in April 1794 and closed in 1894. At our meeting it was quite amazing how our speaker, Roger Halse, brought 'back to life' a canal that has lain derelict for so long. Through endless research he has uncovered many old photographs of the canal and its installations and we were able to compare slides of these old scenes with pictures of the present state of the canal taken in identical positions. Sometimes the series of pictures included the railway that has come and gone in the meantime, and which in places was built on the course of the canal.

During its working life many thousands of tons of coal were transported from the Somerset Coalfield along the canal via the link with the Kennet and Avon at Dundas. These cargoes also greatly contributed to the prosperity of the Kennet & Avon and the Wilts & Berks Canals.

There are still a few features of the Somerset Coal Canal remaining and we wish the Society good luck with their work in the preservation.

Sitting on the border of the Avon & Wilts and Solent & Arun Branches of the IWA, it is always interesting to see who turns up for what subjects. This talk was well attended and drew visitors from both areas.

SOCIETY LIBRARY

mill visit, we will drive to Redbridge, where the Andover and Redbridge Canal met the sea. Here we can study the original warehouses, and the pub menu, and take lunch. Those with picnics can find a river bank or stay at Eling Mill Pond. After lunch, we will visit a section of the Andover & Redbridge Canal that was not built on by the subsequent railway. This exists as part of the Lower Test Nature Reserve, and a section has been dredged to provide a still, fresh water habitat. Remains of a bridge and a lock site can be found. It's the £10,000 shed to store the lawnmower!

More than £10,000 is to be spent on a run down shack by Napton Reservoir - so it can be used as a lawnmower store. Cracks in the wall, which engineers feel are part of the original features, will remain.

British Waterways will spend £10,500 in conservation and heritage repairs to the 1930's brick building, which is by the side of the lock, but want to make sure the repairs are not so noticeable so the hut can retain its character.

Mel Bannister, communications manager for British Waterways, said the hut was important as it was a reminder of yesteryear. She said: "The hut was used by the lock keeper when the canal was used commercially. He would use it to keep warm and to store his tools. The hut still has a fireplace inside it but we don't have a full time lock keeper any more."

British Waterways said it wanted to preserve the hut because it was an interesting building. A part time lock keeper is employed and he will be able to store his lawnmower and tools there.

She said: "It is an example of canalside architecture. The

roof is unusual in engineering terms and it is a nice bit of history.

The small building has a rare arched barrel roof made entirely from carefully tooled bricks and will be strengthened to stop it falling down. A new retaining wall will be built to prevent slippage and steel sections will be fitted to brace the walls. The stone floor will be removed and replaced over a new foundation and a new timber door will be fitted.

Waterways manager Andrew Stumpf said: "Although this hovel is not a listed structure, it is an extremely unusual design with an interesting past, which, thanks to these conservation works, can now be seen and enjoyed by future generations of local people and visitors."

The work should be completed in time for the new holiday boating season which starts in March.

both at concept and detailed design stages with IWA, canal societies and other user groups.

- Towing path development proposals for cycling will protect the built heritage and natural environment of the waterway corridor, the interests of navigation and the safety and convenience of existing users.
- Cycling will be expected to make a contribution to the costs of the maintenance and development of towing paths via funds from the sale of cycle permits and / or through specific grants from European, national or local Government. (There will continue to be special provision for a cycle permit within a private boat licence).

BW confirmed that its bid for additional funding for cycling does not imply the necessary conversion of the whole waterway network to hard surfaced cycle ways. It is not BW's intention to do this. BW's submission to DETR on integrated transport policy says that any adaptation of the network for cycling 'should also enhance the unique heritage and environmental qualities which make inland waterways so desirable for recreation.'

It would seem that BW have been quick in retracting their earlier statements. Surely, BW should have a reasonably consistent policy regarding cycling on their towing paths or at least have listened to all parties before issuing Joint Statements of such a profound nature. What do our readers think?

Bugsworth Basin

After Ian Edgar's talk on the restoration of Bugsworth Basin late last year, members might be interested in the following written by Ian (from Navvies Feb-March 1998):

Probably the most spectacular progress for many years is the transformation of the Entrance Canal which has defied volunteers' efforts to cure the leaks into the cottages at Teapot Row and into the Black Brook.

The radical solution has been to rip out all the old wall, puddle and lining of the canal which was found to be of very poor quality. As it turned out, and quite unknown to us previously (obviously!) volunteers had no chance of curing this by the traditional methods.

A new heavy concrete wall has been constructed in front of the cottages and a drain has been inserted which will divert rising water under the bed away from the cottages to the Black Brook.

The Bentonite membrane has been laid and the clay overlay. The job has run well behind schedule but that's nothing new for Bugsworth which - true to form - has thrown a lot of nasty problems at the professionals as well as us volunteers.

Bits and Pieces
