Repairs to Hurleston Locks

CRT are undertaking major repairs to Lock 4 on the historic Hurleston Lock Flight on the Llangollen Canal in Cheshire. The walls of the 223-year-old Grade II Listed lock have gradually shifted over time making it increasingly difficult for narrowboats to pass through.

Instead of being long and straight to accommodate traditional canal boats, the lock has slowly bowed due to movement in the ground around it.

The work to repair and straighten the lock is costing over £1 million and has involved an archaeological survey before the lock wall on the towpath side was carefully dismantled as part of the painstaking repairs. A new hidden concrete retaining wall will help stabilise the ground and prevent any further movement before a mixture of original stonework and new brickwork is put back in place.

Hurleston Lock Flight was opened in 1805 and was built by famous canal engineers John Fletcher and Thomas Telford. The locks form a link between the former Chester Canal, known today as the Shropshire Union Canal, and the Ellesmere Canal, known today as the Llangollen Canal. The four locks raise the water level 10.4 metres above the Cheshire Plain.

The work is expected to be completed by March 2020.

Canal & River Trust News - 21 January 2020

Toddbrook Reservoir

Early in the new year CRT started a project to enhance the resilience of the dam wall and spillway following damage to the latter in August.

Temporary works are to be carried out on the dam's auxiliary spillway, which was damaged last summer. A protective, waterproof nib (short wall) is to be inserted all along the spillway crest which will reach down into the dam's clay core. The spillway crest will be increased in height by just over one metre at either end and sturdy concrete waterproof barriers will be installed on the spillway slope to channel any overflowing water into the central undamaged section which will be lined for extra protection. The new features will ensure that the dam is secure in any extreme weather events. They will remain in place until permanent reconstruction of the dam is undertaken.

The works to the dam will be followed later in 2020 by improvements to the Todd Brook inlet channel at the head of the reservoir. This will provide greater control over how much water flows from the brook into the reservoir or around the reservoir via a bypass channel. This project will take the opportunity to include the installation of a new footbridge across the brook to create a safe route for people wishing to walk from one side of the valley to the other. During normal weather conditions, while the reservoir remains drained, all flow is sent down the bypass channel i.e. none into the reservoir.

From Lamma Island to Aberdeen Harbour, Hong Kong



Brian and Annegret's daughter, Annemarie, was visiting from Hong Kong and was delighted to be called an overseas member by Alan at the January meeting.

She followed Alan with some photographs of her daily commute in Hong Kong where she lives on an outlying island called Lamma, just one minute from the pier, which is great if she's running late. Lamma has no cars and a few thousand

inhabitants, and is a world away from the skyscrapers of Hong Kong Island and Kowloon.

Annemarie sits on the front of the wooden Chuen Kee ferry and showed us the container ships and fishing boats she passes as well as the white Little Egrets and Black Kites that wait for any available fish as the ferry comes into Aberdeen Harbour.

Annemarie is a self-employed journalist and often works the morning at home before going to work at the radio station at noon, when these two little girls from the village are heading home from their morning classes. As she sits on the front deck, sometimes the first thing she hears as the boat pulls into the pier at Aberdeen is "A-N-N-I-E! A-N-N-I-E!" from this little duo waiting to board.

Annemarie explained how Aberdeen, named after the 4th Earl of Aberdeen, George Hamilton-Gordon, who was a British prime minister in the 1850s, is called locally "Little Hong

Kong" and was the first place where British ships used to get fresh water from a water fall.

These days, sampans still chug around the harbour and Annemarie showed shots of one older couple where the lady was preparing lobster pots to sink and also fishermen checking and repairing their nets on a trawler. These days the trawlers head into the South China Sea towards Vietnam to fish, to preserve the depleted fishing stocks in Hong Kong.

While fewer sampans these days have licences, as their children prefer more comfortable and better paying white collar jobs, some ferry

tourists around the popular harbour and to its famous floating restaurant, while others take passengers out to the outlying islands and if her ferry is no longer running in the late evening, Annemarie can still take a sampan home.

Along the harbour side there are dry docks for fixing small junks and sampans and also a temple to the goddess of the fishing community, Tin Hau. Often boats will also have effigies of Tin Hau on their boats to protect them out at sea.



Annemarie's journey takes 23 minutes across the Lamma Channel one of the busier shipping straits in the world, with regular container ships heading

across out of Victoria Harbour and past the southwestern side of the island, often accompanied out by pilot boats.

This was the first time that Annemarie has talked to SCS members.







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Future of the Society

At a recent meeting of the Committee the future of the Society was raised again. This was caused by the need for the Society to elect a new Chairman at the AGM in July.

There is no avoiding the fact that the Society is slowly declining. In common with most voluntary organisations we are not attracting new members, and natural causes mean that active membership is declining. We see this in the attendance at the last few meetings, where we have had some excellent speakers. The Society paid-up membership is currently around 35, but the attendance has been less than 20 on each occasion (apart from the Quiz meeting). This means we are attracting around 50% of the membership, which is a good ratio, but the low numbers can be embarrassing, especially when the speaker has travelled some distance. There is also the not insignificant item of the cost of hiring good speakers. Speaker's fees and expenses have been increasing, and it is only the generosity of members who attend

and buy raffle tickets (and donate prizes) that prevents the Society running at a loss.

The declining membership also means that the Society is dependent on a few members to organise the meetings and run the Society. The key role is the Secretary, who organises the programme and finds the speakers, but the Society is also dependent on those members who turn out to every meeting to set out and clear the hall and organise the raffle and refreshments. The Society will need to elect a new Chairman in July, and currently we have no candidates.

Members need to decide the future direction of the Society. We would like members to send their suggestions to the Secretary to be included as items on the Agenda for the AGM. This means they will need to received by the first meeting of the Society's year, 2 April 2020.

Clean air strategy

IWA have responded to the Department for Transport's call for evidence on air pollutant emissions from domestic vessels and inland waterways.

Our response includes our updated environmental guidance for boaters with specific information relating to London, legislation, propulsion, electricity generation, stoves and water pollution.

The Government are seeking to understand more clearly the extent of emissions from vessels that do not currently fall within the scope of environmental regulations and to establish if government can do more to address emission issues.

The first battery-hybrid inland barge

Volvo Penta has contributed to a project with shipyard Concordia Damen and operator Sendo Shipping to deliver the first battery-hybrid inland barge - the Sendo Liner. Now the container ship has won the prestigious KNVTS Ship of the Year 2019 Maritime Award for its remarkable 40% reduction in CO2 emissions.

Based in the Netherlands, Sendo Shipping has maintained a 24/7 container liner service for more than 15 years between the seaports of Rotterdam, Amsterdam and Antwerp – as well as various inland terminals in the north of the Netherlands.

Now the company is moving to uncharted waters with the launch of the first battery-hybrid inland barge.

A 110m inland container ship operating routes between the North of the Netherlands and the Port of Rotterdam, the aim of the Sendo Liner is to create a diesel-electric vessel that massively reduces CO2 emissions and is able to sail emissions-free through Rotterdam harbour – a feat that's rewarded by a waiver on harbour tax. To reach this low emission goal Sendo Shipping focused on three key areas: fuel efficiency, optimized hull design and lower power requirements.

Sendo Shipping discussed several options for the propulsion solution with Koedood Marine Group. Together they designed the whole propulsion line, including its battery bank. Out of several options and brands, the two Volvo Penta D16 engines, with a 450kW output, were chosen as being the best fit and most fuel-efficient option. From then on Volvo Penta worked as an advisor to the project. With over 100 years'



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experience in marine propulsion and some large pioneering hybrid projects under its belt, Volvo Penta is able to tailor a solution to a particular vessel and understands the whole boatbuilding process, from design to operation.

"We really enjoyed working with Volvo Penta," said Gertjan de Gelder, Sales Director, Koedood Marine Group. "The ease of communication and integration of its total solution made collaboration simple and efficient. The engines perform and react quickly when extra power is required. The Volvo Penta D16 Gensets run at optimal fuel efficiency, which

contributes to the reduction in CO2 emissions of the vessel."

These dual engines act as the propulsion and power supply for the entire vessel – charging the Lithium-lon batteries – which have a total capacity of 564 kWh (the equivalent of seven Volvo XC40 P8 AWD electric cars). The impressive liner can run for two to three hours on battery alone, before switching to diesel mode.

"We have never used Volvo Penta before in any of our vessels," said Sebastiaan van der Meer, Owner of Sendo Shipping. "But we have been so impressed by the performance, fuel efficiency and service provided by Volvo Penta we've transformed from a first-time customer to an ambassador for the Volvo Penta brand. 'Trust Aware' stickers for those who need support

CRT is to begin providing 'Trust Aware' permits to boaters who have been The permits, which were suggested by the boaters themselves, are granted an adjustment to their cruising requirements under the Equality Act 2010.
