The "Welcome to Yorkshire" garden at RHS Chelsea Flower Show has received a highly coveted Gold Medal - a fitting celebration as the tourism organisation celebrates its 10th anniversary and 10th garden at the world-famous flower show. The garden is inspired by Yorkshire's proud industrial heritage and stunning natural environment with the aim of encouraging more people to visit and experience the county's beauty first hand. The highlight of the design is an authentically built canal with flowing water and genuine lock gates. The garden also includes a towpath and a lock keeper's lodge with a colourful garden and vegetable patch.

CRT donated the lock gates, which were removed from right outside Huddersfield University on the Huddersfield Narrow Canal after reaching the end of their working life.

Annual General Meeting 2019

Annual national boat count

CRT's annual national boat count shows that licence compliance on their waterways remains high with 96.5% of boaters holding a valid licence.

The national boat count also shows how rates differ across the country, as well as changes in boat numbers. The boat count identified a 2.3% increase in boat numbers, with all regions except the North West seeing small increases in boat numbers. London & South East was the only region where licence compliance was under 95% (at 94.1%).

Jon Horsfall, head of customer service support at CRT, said: "I'd like to thank all those boaters who pay their licence on time. It's important that boats are licensed correctly. Not only does this mean they're insured and hold a boat safety certificate, but it means they're playing their part in

contributing to the huge task of keeping our canals and rivers open. Boat licences contribute around 10% of our total income so it's important that everyone who keeps a boat on our waterways pays their fair share.

"However on occasion we do have to take robust action to remove boats. In 2018/19 106 boats were removed from our canals and rivers as they were unlicensed or in breach of our terms and conditions despite the best efforts of our Boat Licence Customer Support team."

The survey, completed in March, records boats on waterways across England and Wales and provides a comprehensive snap-shot of licence evasion. The information is used to support the day-to-day work carried out by the Trust.

CRT's winter maintenance programme 2019-2020

Canal & River Trust (CRT) have published their draft winter maintenance programme for 2019-20 and are asking boaters to take a look and give their feedback on the plans.

Comments are welcome until Friday 14 June when we will review them and, if necessary, make changes to the programme. Boaters will then have a further chance to comment before the finalised plans are published at the end of the summer.

Matthew Symonds, national boating manager at CRT, said: "Each winter we concentrate our efforts

on essential repairs and maintenance while the waterways are quieter – last year spending £38 million on keeping them open and accessible for boaters. Work can temporarily close the canals and occasionally the towpath so before we finalise our plans we want to ask boaters for your views to make sure there's as little disruption as possible.

"Winter might be the last thing on your mind right now, however your views do make a difference when it comes to shaping our busy programme so please let us know your thoughts."



Waverley tied up until 2020

WAVERLEY Excursions have announced that LNER-built PS Waverley, the world's last sea-going paddle steamer, will not sail at all in 2019 and will remain tied up until at least 2020.

Work on retubing and repairing the ship's boilers was suspended on Friday 10 May after it became clear that new boilers were needed. Management reluctantly took the decision to cancel all sailings for 2019 and to launch an appeal to meet the cost of new boilers to allow the ship to take to the waters again in 2020.

Recently appointed general manager, Paul Semple said: "We have taken this decision after extensive consultation and seeking advice on the best way forward and we apologise to all who looked forward to sailing with us this season. Full refunds will be given on all booked tickets. The ship needs new boilers but, in every other respect, is in excellent order. As soon as we have firm prices and explored potential funding sources, we will launch a public appeal to help meet the costs so we can sail again in 2020."

Mooring the boat at its Glasgow base for the entire season, will have revenue implications for the charity, while early estimates for new boilers point to a figure in excess of £2m. Not only will part of the ship's superstructure have to be removed to allow the old boilers to be removed and replacements fitted, but there are issues to be addressed when specifying the new boilers. These include being able to burn acceptable fuel types in future and meeting tightening emission regulations to future-proof Waverley in a fast-changing environmental culture. These issues are increasingly affecting all steam-powered vessels, locomotives and vehicles in the heritage sector as action on climate change ramps up.

Notes to the Accounts

The most notable feature of the accounts this year is that the Society had a deficit for the first time for some years. There are a number of reasons for this.

The most significant reason was two one-off payments, the Hon. Secretary Expenses for the last two years and a late invoice for the celebratory cake for the Society Jubilee. There has been an increase in Speaker Fees, which reflects the fact that more speakers are charging expenses. Another reason was the fact that we did not have a visit from Daystar this year. While we do not plan to make a surplus, we usually end up with a slight one. A more serious reason was an increase in the cost of Insurance via the IWA.

Previously the IWA had organised this themselves. Late last year they notified all affiliated societies that they had arranged the insurance through a commercial broker. There was a delay while this occurred with the result that I had no time to review the details of the insurance cover or the price before I had to pay the premium. The policy provided was more suitable for a much bigger Society with assets, buildings and

Montgomery Canal progress

Thanks to a four-year, £4 million project, boats should soon be returning to a section of the Montgomery Canal near Oswestry for the first time since the canal was closed due to a breach in 1936.

CRT has been working with volunteers from the Shropshire Union Canal Society and contractors to upgrade nearly five miles (8km) of towpath, restore 1¼ miles (2km) of the canal to navigation from Maesbury to Crickheath and create a winding hole. Construction has just been completed and it is currently being filled with water, which will take about three weeks.

Montgomery Canal Partnership chair John Dodwell said: "This is a great step forward and will mean 60% of this historic, lovely canal has been restored. We look forward to more support from the public – both by volunteers and by donations – to enable us to make further progress."

As I mentioned in the April Newsletter, I have been working on updating and improving the Society's website. In particular I have been working on that part of the site that deals with the Itchen Navigation. I also mentioned that I hoped to put the pages concerned online by the end of June to commemorate the last cargo carrying barge to reaching Winchester in June 1869. (Vokes & Beck Monumental Masons) when replacing a corbel on the ancient building.

Vokes and Becks, a stonemason company based in Winchester which had proudly undertaken the Abbey's work for ten years, discovered whilst repairing the parapet stones on the South West level, that the corbels were structurally unsound and had to renew them, As the original Binstead limestone from the Isle of Wight quarry was no longer available, it was decided to use a Portland stone; it was sound, available and economically viable. (£40 per corbel).

Any badly damaged corbels were matched to the originals, but where the corbels had eroded too much, it was left to the stonemasons to create designs of their choosing - as was the tradition. A number ball flower carvings were used as well as portraits.

Peter who has celebrated his 100th birthday was recently given a surprise party, organised by Shelia Phillips and the members of South Wonston Senior Club. The party was attended by four generations of the family, the youngest



of whom is Eva aged five months. Winchester mayor, Cllr. Frank Pearson came along for the afternoon and presented Peter with a bottle of Champagne donated by Waitrose Ltd to mark the occasion.

Peter was surrounded by his family, friends and many centenary cards, including one from The Queen; and a special birthday cake.
