OCTOBER MEETING. The talk and slides entitled 'The Boat Museum at Ellesmere Port' by Tony Hirst was not just about a museum. Tony showed us historic pictures of waterways in the North West and compared them with modern ones taken from the same spots.

We heard how the museum site developed over the years to the enterprise it is today and how some of the exhibits were acquired and moved in. There is a reference library where serious waterways students can research facts and the museum site is the point where many thousands of school children have been introduced to waterways for the first time.

Tony's enthusiasm for the Museum was obvious throughout his talk and if some of this brushes off onto some of the visiting school children then we should thank him and his staff for providing the waterways with new young supporters.

ROSIE & JIM'S appearance at the National Waterways Festival at Windmill End caused the nearest that British Waterways has ever seen to Beatle Mania.


Who are Rosie & Jim you might be asking, (especially if you don't have young children)?

They are two ragdoll puppets who appear on a childrens television series

with their creator, John Cunliffe. They all live on a narrowboat called 'Ragdoll' and the series is based on

the inland waterways.

British Waterways is using this programme as an effective vehicle to pass on the 'Be Water Wise' message to children. BW has a 15 second trailer after every second episode showing its logo and advertising a childrens canal and water safety play pack.



NAVVIES No.128 to celebrate 25 years of publication has recently been printed with colour cover pictures for the first time and some very good glossy black and white ones inside.

All were taken at digs which marked milestones along the route of volunteer waterways restoration - Welshpool 1969, Dudley Dig 1970, ASHTAC 1972 and Droitwich Dig 1973.

A copy of 'Navvies Notebook' No.1 made up the centre pages, and how it has changed. The 'Notebook' bit was dropped between No.25 (July 1970) and No.26 (September 1970).

Through 'Navvies', the Waterway Recovery Group has been able to build and organise a large work force which over the years has become efficient and capable of tackling most restoration projects.

The diary, October 5th - December, in No.128 lists at least 15 sites where work will be taking place - and there are more.

The latest 'big dig' was Wantage '91, held on 12th - 13th October. WRG were fairly confident that 1000 navvies would be there to reclaim two miles of derelict canal in one weekend.

Were any of our members among the 1000? If so - would they write down their observations for the 'Newsletter'.

Through rocketing inflation the subscription to 'Navvies' has been held low so that it is available to all, especially the young without income. Minimum subscription is still only 95p (but of course a loss is being made at that price) for 4 to 6 copies per year.

CHRISTMAS BOATING. Thinking of hiring a narrowboat over the Christmas or New Year period?

In the November '91 issue of Waterways World there is a list of companies who have boats available for hire during these periods and also a Hotel Boat company who are running cruises.

LONG DISTANCE TOWPATHS. The 140 mile London to Birmingham towpath walk following the Grand Union Canal is not just a pipe dream. The four county councils have given grants to fund research into the project.

The route starts at Paddington and should finish under Spaghetti Junction in Birmingham but it is planned to extend the walk along part of the BCN to Gas Street Basin. This is a more pleasant terminus and it has the advantage of being near a main line station, as is the start and numerous intermediate points.

IRISH CANALS Work has started on the restoration of the Ballinamore & Ballyconnel Canal which joins the River Shannon to Upper Lough Erne.

It is planned to have an eight mile stretch of waterway open to navigation at each end of the Canal by the summer of 1992 and restoration of the complete 36 miles of canal open by 1993.
