August Meeting (actually 31 July) Peter Oates and Laura Sturrock

Up until a few years ago our August meetings were, traditionally, poorly attended, presumably because most members were taking their holidays at that time. However, in recent times the situation has improved as we found with this year's August meeting (which had to be held on 31 July because of the hall not being available to us during August) when Peter's and Laura's talk was very well attended.

Their presentation was divided into two completely different topics. The first half of the evening concentrated on working boats on the inland waterways and the different methods of handling pairs of boats and working locks. We were shown in the region of 60 excellent slides featuring many working boats known to us; working boat gatherings; the handling of the boats; and, of course, the people who worked the boats. Throughout the presentation Peter maintained a very informative narrative, with Laura's assistance.

The second half of their programme was devoted to a range of slides of the Itchen Navigation, many being 'before and after' shots, showing scenes of the navigation, its buildings and surroundings from the 1970s and 1980s, compared with 2003. For those of us who have lived in the area for some time it was interesting to note the changes that have taken place over the last twenty to thirty years. Unfortunately, we ran out of time that evening, and were not able to complete the Itchen Navigation presentation. However, as Peter pointed out, all the slides shown and those we did not have time for can be found on the Society's website.

Obviously, the main stream of his presentation concentrated on the beautifully scenic Macclesfield Canal and the Peak Forest Canal, including the latter's resurrection from dereliction. Of particular interest were the pictures of Bugsworth Basins, on the Upper Peak Forest Canal, in their working days. It is hard to equate those scenes with the current day picture of the basins, now largely restored and awaiting the next stage of their development and interpretation.

Viewers will see life on the water

In partnership with British Waterways and the Environment Agency, the British Marine Federation has commissioned a new 18-part television series that will be aired on Channel 4 for four years, starting this autumn.

There will be around 200 broadcasts during the period with audiences averaging around two million viewers. These short programmes, between five and 14 minutes long, will promote the pleasures of the British marine leisure industry and its Inland Waterways, including canals, rivers, lakes and the Broads.

The focus will be on individuals whose lives revolve around their passion for the waterways. The series promises to provide a unique insight into life on the water as well as promoting Britain's waterways network.

The series sees a colourful array of people sharing their remarkable stories such as the Mikron Theatre Company, a group of travelling players who spend their summers touring the canal network performing plays every night. Viewers will enjoy the fascinating tale of Cliff Jones who gave up a 30-year career on the buses to follow his dream of living on a narrow boat as well as an insight into the lifestyle of a wildlife photographer and the adrenaline packed stunts of Shaun Baker, the world's foremost extreme kayaker.
