Victorian Waterway Journey Recreated

A Victorian gentleman's historic voyage to the South Coast on inland waterways has been commemorated by a flotilla of small boats on the River

Wey. Canoeists and kayakers followed the first part of J B Dashwood's trip to the Solent 150 years ago, on the River Wey, Wey & Arun Canal and the River Arun. The commemoration -"Dashwood Day" on Saturday, July 8th was organised jointly by the National Trust and the Wey & Arun Canal Trust.

Tropical catfish found in Walsall Canal

A tropical fish usually found in the Amazon Basin in South America has been discovered in a Black Country canal. The leopard pleco, from the catfish family, was spotted by contractors who had drained Walsall Canal for maintenance work.

Sold to eat algae off the side of tanks, it is thought someone has dumped the unwanted fish in the waterway. The Canal and River Trust believes it must have been recently as it would

not have survived a winter. John Ellis, national fisheries and angling manager with the trust, said the fish - which has not been sexed - had done well not be eaten by a native pike.

The canal was drained between Locks 1 and 2 at Ryders Green for the work by MEN Fisheries on 7 August and an electric current passed through the water to temporarily stun the fish so they could be gathered in a net and removed.



"You'd expect to find the normal, native species when doing this, like perch, bream, or roach," he said. "But this was totally out of the blue.

"At first, the contractors thought it was a bull head - a native fish that is quite rare to find as they've suffered from pollution - but when they were looking at it, it was nothing of the sort. "They took it back to their headquarters and put it into a tank. If a fish is eating, it's healthy and

it's happily now munching it's way through the algae on the side of that tank."

But Mr Ellis appealed to people not to discard unwanted, foreign species into UK waterways. "Obviously someone decided they didn't want it and put it in the canal, but that's not the right thing to do as there's lots of issues there, especially around bacteria and parasites," he added. Unfortunately omitted from last month's Newsletter was this picture of this superb cake (as always) made by Pam McKeown to celebrate the society's jubilee year and was part of the post-AGM nibbles and chat.



An update on licensing consultation

Following the completion of the opening stages of their boat licensing consultation, Canal & River Trust have published a report on the views aired in the second stage of the consultation.

The second stage of the consultation involved a series of workshops, which were held across the country and included a cross section of the boating community.

In the next few weeks CRT will invite all boaters and boating groups to take part in the third and final stage of the consultation, where they will put forward a series of proposals on the future of boat licensing. These proposals will have been informed by the first two stages of the consultation.

Ian Rogers, customer service and operations director at the CRT, comments: "I'd like to thank everyone who has taken part in the boat licensing consultation so far – the conversations have been thought-provoking and are helping us shape the final stage of our consultation.

"The proposals will be published on our website, as well as hard copies available on request from our offices, so everyone will have a chance to see them.

"It is important that we have a full view of boaters' thoughts and feelings to help shape the future of licensing. Please take advantage of this opportunity to make your voices heard."

Kennet & Avon Waterways celebrates its volunteers



83-year-old John Webb, who volunteers for the Canal & River Trust, has recently been awarded a Gold Volunteer Award in recognition of him giving over 2,000 hours to help care for the historic Kennet & Avon Canal.

John is one of 40 volunteers that have been awarded a special gold badge by the Trust this year. The aim of the award is to celebrate the amazing contribution volunteers have made in helping to keep the nation's canals looking good for the thousands of visitors throughout the year.

John, who lives in Bath and is a retired Chartered Quantity Surveyor, has been volunteering with us since we were formed in 2012 and helped establish the Towpath Taskforce group in Bath. The group meets weekly and carries out various tasks including removing graffiti, cutting back overhanging trees, filling in potholes and painting lock gates.

As a keen boater John has taken an active role in restoring the Toll House at Dundas Wharf, the 'Hovel' at Bathampton, re-building the historic timber crane at Burbage Wharf and landscaping the canal junction with the River Avon at Widcombe. John is also Honorary Vice President of the Kennet & Avon Trust.

Steve Manzi, volunteer coordinator at the Canal & River Trust, said: "We are so lucky to have John volunteering with us along the canal and I'm delighted he has been awarded this Gold Award in recognition for all his hard work and commitment in helping us care for the waterways. Volunteers really help bring our waterways to life and we want more people just like John to donate their time and help us care for and preserve these 200-year-old open air museums so everyone can enjoy them."

Dogmersfield slip - nearly finished

Much to everyone's relief, navigation past the Dogmersfield slip reopened in July. *Madam Butterfly*, a cruising boat operated on the Basingstoke Canal by the charity Accessible Cruising, passed through without difficulty - plenty of depth of water there.

It was clear though that a considerable amount of work still remained to be done and at the time of writing in mid-August it looks as if the contractors will not be disappearing until, probably, October.

Going through in July, the protruding heads of the ground anchors that are intended to keep the piles upright looked rather intimidating and dangerous for passing boats.

However, a more recent trip revealed that in front of them there are now rows of wooden posts with what looks like nicospan mesh between them backfilled to the piles. This produces a shelf about a foot

Finally, we let go the ropes on Sunday 13th August and cruised in *Purton* up to Brinklow in 6 hours. On the Monday, we passed through Hawkesbury stop lock, on to Nuneaton and down the 11 locks at Atherstone. This involved 10 hours motoring by the time we moored at Fradley Junction. We made good use of the facilities the next morning. Now on the Trent & Mersey canal. Going through the locks we met Harry Arnold. He is one of the old enthusiasts: a writer and photographer. He keeps in touch with SCS with our Newsletter and our current situation was briefly discussed.

We moored that night at Branston of pickle fame. Next on through Burton-upon- Trent which is widely known for its brewing industry, which originated in the 13th century. We moored later near the old Willington Power Station site.

On Friday we cruised through the very interesting and attractive canal village of Shardlow, with the Trent & Mersey going through its centre, on our way to Derwent Mouth and the end of the T and M.

Next it was on down the River Trent, under the M1 through a flood lock with traffic lights. We continued down through the manned Sawley

wide in which, presumably, plants will grow and eventually improve the look of this stretch of the canal again.

The ground anchors were apparently a major cause of delay for the project, as the original design pulled out of the soft ground.

The towpath itself between the slip site and Blacksmith's Bridge has also seen a huge amount of work, intended to raise it and reinforce the embankment. Again, this all looks a bit stark at the moment but will be green again by next summer.

According to the BCA's James Taylor, the work should keep things stable here for at least the next 125 years! Let's hope that John Pinkerton's cuttings and embankments don't have any more surprises in store for us.

lock, to the Erewash Canal at Trent Lock. Having passed through the lock, we moored up for two days after a pub lunch (our first). We then paired up with the Big Woolwich *Fulbourne* for the run up to the festival site at Ilkeston.

At this point it should be mentioned that in 1941, *Purton* and her butty *Stoulton,* on their way from Langley Mill to Croxley Mill in London, managed to burst through the bottom gates at Sandiacre Lock where they spent nearly a week carefully offloading their cargo of coal with the use of buckets. (We had no problem this time). The marks are still in the wall of the lock cottage were the lock beam swung back and hit the wall.

On the Monday, we left the site and headed up to Langley Mill at the head of the canal, watered up ,stayed the night and headed back down with acquaintances from Byfleet Boat Club that we met last year. At the time of writing, we are on our festival mooring looking forward to the coming weekend.

Wilts & Berks Canal - Studley Grange

Between Royal Wootton Bassett and Swindon is the Studley Grange section of the Wilts & Berks Canal. Other than urban environments, this 1.2 kilometre stretch of canal is possibly the most difficult section of restoration to be undertaken. Nowhere else along the route through the countryside do we face the challenges of restoring the canal next to a landfill



site. The neighbouring land, which BIFFA have used as a landfill site for many years and which is now being closed, is physically much higher than it ever was at the time the old canal ran past it. But we did have an opportunity to make use of the landfill to save hundreds of thousands of pounds providing that we completed the project before closure of the site and addressed the major engineering challenges inherent in building the Studley Grange section.

We did it: a task that looked to us almost impossible from an engineering and funding point-of-view was completed through the support of our enthusiastic members and with funding from large donors and from our membership. Eventually we needed substantial loans from three of our members in 2016 and 2017, who have been exceptionally supportive of our endeavours, to complete the project and cope with the cost overruns. We are arranging the official opening of the Studley Grange section shortly.

However the scale of the works at Studley Grange has put the Trust under considerable strain and we have difficulties that we must face up to. The need for the loans arose because of significant cost overruns. These additional costs related to many factors, from the discovery of a great-crested newt through adverse weather to variations in the work undertaken, but also to significant failings by contractors. The Trust too has made mistakes in how the contract was negotiated and in how the project was initially managed. The current management of the Trust commissioned a quantity surveyor, expert in contracts management, to review the whole project and to identify where various parties may be at fault both inside and outside the Trust. This will form the basis of claims against those parties.

Nevertheless we have completed the work and now have to deal with

ensuring that we can repay those three members, who have lent us a total of almost $\pm 300,000$.

We, as Chair of the Board of Trustees and as CEO, have been dealing with these issues since our appointment in the autumn of 2015, and the new Executive in July 2016 began the process of raising additional funds. We

may recover some money from our claims against the various parties, but much will have to come from the continuing support of our membership. We need to complete this now.

Needless to say we have learnt from the mistakes made in the past, and we have and will make changes to the way the Trust operates at all levels.

We have targeted raising an extra £25,000 each year from extra regular donations from members, and also from new membership. This is why we designated 2017 as the first membershipdrive year. We will also need to increase the annual membership fee.

How can you help?
