#### **Toddbrook Reservoir**

As members are no doubt aware from press reports, the overflow spillway on the dam at Toddbrook Reservoir near Whaley Bridge suffered substantial damage after days of intense rain and

flooding at the end of
July especially on the 31st.
To avoid the possible
danger of the loss of life in
the town below the dam,
roads were closed and
residents evacuated.

Following a multi-agency around-the-clock effort, which saw over a billion litres of water pumped

from the reservoir, just after lunchtime on 7 August, it was declared safe for residents of Whaley Bridge to return home. The water level in the reservoir was lowered by over 10 metres to reduce the pressure on the weakened dam.

Pumps remain on site

to remove any further rainfall from the reservoir.

An RAF Chinook helicopter placed over 500 one tonne bags filled with aggregate to further stabilise the spillway. These bags were then grouted together to consolidate them.

A major fish rescue is needed to re-home an estimated 30,000 fish (about 5,000kg) which have been affected by the draining of the reservoir. Whilst a few have been captured in large nets, the remainder will only be

removed and re-homed in a few weeks' time when the weather is cooler and it is much better for the health of the fish.

Coarse fish, such as bream, roach, perch and pike, have been captured in large nets by fish specialists and transported mostly to Upper

Bittell Reservoir, near Birmingham. This reservoir has low fish stocks after it was drained and refilled following maintenance works two years ago and therefore is able to accommodate the large amount of fish without upsetting the local ecosystem.

Project manager Rob Jowitt commented: "Moving on from the emergency response, our job is to find out what went wrong and prepare a detailed plan for repairing the damaged dam wall. It is a huge job which is likely to take some time."

## Locking restrictions lifted

The torrential rain conditions might have caused a one-off near-disaster at Whaley Bridge, but they have been a relief to much of the rest of the country.

The deluge that disrupted the Peak Forest Canal caused restrictions to be lifted in the Midlands within the week, particularly thanks to reservoirs across the Braunston and Leicester summit quickly refilling, although the Canal & River Trust also claimed credit for reducing demands by introducing local water saving restrictions, and doing some short-duration summer stoppage works such as relining lock gates.

CRT used the occasion to issue this plea to Midlands boaters: "It's helpful to aim for minimal contact when navigating through locks by ensuring gates are fully open when passing through as pushing gates open using a boat can damage the gate lining, increasing its leakage. Thank you for your help."

Restrictions on the Leeds & Liverpool Canal were lifted in late July, while water pumping problems on the Kennet & Avon Canal summit were mastered by early August.

## Historic canal mills destroyed by fire

The historic Walkley Clogs Mill alongside the Rochdale Canal at Mytholmroyd has been demolished after being devastated by fire on 1st August. Although the blaze was quickly brought under control, the local council took the decision to demolish the building for safety.

Previously home to clog manufacturers Walkley, the Victorian building had been turned into a World of Clogs tourist attraction when the company moved its manufacturing to another mill nearby.

Successive plans to convert it to housing or find a canal-related use fell through and it had become derelict.

The building was better known to succeeding generations of working

boatmen as Maude's Clog Mill, and was built to take advantage of the canal. As Maude's it was the largest manufacturer of clog soles in the world, reaching a peak of 1.2m pairs by World War II, although the canal's role in their production ceased in the 1920s.

Barely a week after the blaze destroyed the Walkley Clogs building on the Rochdale Canal, another historic canalside mill was destroyed on the Ashton Canal on 6th August.

Oxford Mill, at Ashton-under-Lyne, was the creation of Hugh Mason, a pioneering and enlightened mill owner and later Liberal MP.

## Seeking new homes for boats

The National Waterways Museum is seeking new homes for 12 vessels following a review of the historic importance of all boats currently in its collection.

We will first offer the boats free of charge to accredited museums and then to individuals and private organisations who are able to meet the demands of caring for the vessels.

Like all museums, the <u>National Waterways Museum</u> faces the challenge - from funding and conservation to exhibition options and storage - of looking after large numbers of objects in its care, and following a review by an expert panel, plans to focus its resources on a reduced number of the most historically significant vessels.

The decision to let any object go is not taken lightly. However, the Trust has identified the boats it needs to re-home. These range from the iron hulls of icebreakers to a salmon fishing boat. In some cases, the museum already has better examples of that type of vessel, while other boats don't play a significant role in telling the history of the waterways that the museum focuses on, and so are likely to better suited to a new home. Some boats are of less interest as they have been changed so much over the decades that very little original material remains.

Graham Boxer, head of collections and archives explains: "As a collection of national significance we have specific obligations around the 68 boats in our care. Our dedicated staff and volunteers have strived to find solutions to the many challenges in caring for such a large fleet, but ultimately, with limited funds and storage space, we need to reduce the number of boats in the collection to focus our efforts on those of the greatest historic importance, and so re-homing some is the right option. We anticipate that there are museums that may be interested to take some vessels, and there are many enthusiasts who could provide the right loving homes for these displaced vessels, as they do for many of the most historic boats still in use on the waterways today.

"By re-homing some of the vessels we'll be better able to safeguard the

overall future of the National Waterways Collection. Our review concluded that it is far better to have a representative collection of fewer items, comprising the most historically significant, cared for in the most appropriate way and in the best possible condition, than many in a poor state."

Hannah Cunliffe, Director of National Historic Ships UK said: "We support the approach being taken by the Canal & River Trust in reviewing its large collection and implementing changes necessary to ensure a sustainable future for the most significant craft. We are pleased that the Trust has chosen to adopt the principles set down in our guidance publications to inform this process and are happy to work with them during the decision-making period. We hope that a heritage solution is found for the vessels made available to re-home and would be glad to offer further advice to any individuals or organisations considering taking these craft on."

It is hoped that new homes will be found for all twelve boats. If this is unfortunately not possible, some may have to be recommended for documented deconstruction, applying the Trust's expertise in recording historic vessels to compile detailed records of the boat to preserve the boat's story for future reference and potentially inform future conservation or restoration work on other historic boats.

The vessels are being offered free of charge, with the new owner being asked to pay only the transport costs. **The deadline for expressions of interest is 2 November 2019**.
