CRT 2018/19 annual report and accounts

CRT have published their 2018/19 annual report and accounts, which detail continued investment in our 2,000 miles of waterways across England and Wales. As well as further growth in the number of volunteers and supporters helping to look after their local canal or river.

Spending on the Trust's charitable activities topped £156m while those volunteering for the Trust gave a record 670,000 hours of their time. Green Flag status continued to grow with 250 miles of waterway now holding the quality assurance mark at year end (now 300 miles), there was a small rise in boats on the network, and record numbers of children were engaged through the Trust's education programme.

Chief executive Richard Parry comments: "While delivering our waterway operation, maintenance and repair remains our priority, we are striving for greater efficiency so that our funds can go further. The past year has seen us reminded of the scale of • 420 local groups – canal adoption groups, corour core responsibility with some extreme weather contributing to infrastructure damage and to severe water shortages in many areas in the peak summer months.

"Our capacity to deliver on our broader strategic agenda has been strengthened this year through a major restructure that has seen accountability devolved into regional teams whose priorities reflect the needs and aspirations of each area that they serve.

"The renaissance of the canals continues to go from strength to strength and the network we manage today is in better health than ever, with many thousands of volunteers now helping us to care for the navigations we operate, and an everexpanding range of partner groups working alongside us to make a difference to the waterways in their local communities. The ongoing value of our canal and river navigations is no longer in doubt, and the numbers already spending time on or by

our waterways proves their enduring popularity. With environmental causes gaining more support than ever before, the Trust is active in embracing the 'think global but act local' message to deliver beauty and wellbeing on the doorstep for millions of people."

Highlights in the 2018/19 annual report and accounts include:

- An increase in charitable spending to £156m with record spend on waterway operation, maintenance and repair
- Growth in volunteering to 671,000 hours, with the first volunteer recording 10,000 hours of service for the Trust, and a 27% growth in volunteer lock keepers to 1,130
- A further increase as Keep Britain Tidy's Green Flag status awarded to 250 miles of canals at year end (now 300 miles)
- porate volunteers and community groups helping to care for the Trust's canals
- Over 92,000 children enjoyed face-to-face sessions with the Trust's Explorer's team and nearly 4,000 adults and children took part in a 'Let's Fish!' taster-session
- An increase in boats of 0.5% to 34,367 with boating accounting for around 22% of overall income
- The publication of the first Boater report explaining how the Trust generates income, including the contribution from boaters, and how the money is spent across the network
- A growth in Friends (those making a regular financial donation) rising 18% to almost 29,000

Red Diesel Consultation

IWA is appealing to boaters and boatyard operators to respond to an HMRC consultation following the announcement that private pleasure craft in the UK will be prohibited from using red diesel. The consultation, about the likely timescales required for implementing the change, follows the statement in the Spring Budget that HMRC would seek evidence on the impact of the government's proposal to comply with the judgment made last year by the European Court of Justice.

IWA met with HMRC officials late last year, along with British Marine, the Cruising Association, and the Royal Yachting Association; with all four boating representative bodies putting the case that a change to using white diesel would create insurmountable problems for boat users and the industry.

The implementation of the ruling would mean the end of the use of red diesel for any leisure boating. Whilst red diesel could continue to be used for heating, it would have to be in a separate tank, and there would be no dispensation for any proportion of fuel used by the engine for generating heat and light. Commercially operated boats would still be able to use red diesel, as would residential boaters with proof of fixed moorings, but boats without a home mooring who are continuously cruising would be required to use white diesel.

IWA considers that it is not practical for most boats that use the inland waterways to have two tanks; that inappropriate modifications would raise safety concerns; and that many diesel suppliers would simply not supply both red and white diesel due to the costs of installing additional equipment. IWA is particularly concerned that this change may encourage people to take measures that could adversely impact the environment and safety, such as increased use of generators in confined spaces or spillages from containers of fuel purchased away from the waterways. IWA is also concerned that the increased costs faced by both boat owners and boatyard operators will make an already expensive pastime unaffordable to some existing boaters and to many potential new boaters.

IWA will be taking up the offer from HMRC for further meetings during the consultation, and encourages all boating organisations, boatyards, diesel suppliers, and boat owners to respond to the consultation and provide evidence of the practical implications of the proposals.

Robin Higgs

With the passing of Robin Higgs, who died on 20th June, aged 88, inland waterways restoration lost one of its most ardent and successful supporters. His first involvement with canals was at IWA's National Festival at Woking in 1962 and he started in earnest in the early years of the Waterway Recovery Group, when he acted as WRG's first plant manager and founder Graham Palmer's chauffeur.

Graham was legendary for his leadership of waterways restoration in the late 1960s and '70s and his appearances around the country, but he couldn't drive - so it was Robin who took him everywhere, And it was no accident that WRG was launched on Robin's home patch at the IWA National Festival at Guildford in 1970.

It was perhaps on the Basingstoke Canal that Robin achieved his greatest success. He became a member of the Surrey & Hampshire Canal Society soon after its formation in 1966, and led the campaign to persuade Surrey and Hampshire county councils to take it into public ownership and implement the restoration. He became chair of the canal

Fundraising - Cotswold Canals Trust

Stroud District Council and the Cotswold Canals Trust are leading the **Cotswold Canals Connected** project to reconnect the Stroudwater Navigation to England's navigable waterways, at Saul Junction. Our other partners are *Gloucestershire County Council, Canal and River Trust* and *Gloucestershire Wildlife Trust*.

The whole project will cost about £24 million. In 2017 we secured the initial funding from the key partners and the *National Lottery Heritage Fund* to generate surveys, designs, approvals and final costs, and we will be submitting the final application to the *Heritage Fund*, very soon. Volunteers will contribute work to the value of around £2.5 million and we have been fundraising locally and nationally for a contribution of £1.6 million to make the bid viable.

The Fundraising team have been working non-stop to raise this contribution towards **Cotswold Canals Connected** and have continued to gain support from individuals, organisations and grant giving trusts and foundations. With thanks to these efforts we have made great strides to achieving the matched funds needed to bid for the development stage and are on the homeward stretch....

society in 1974 and remained until the restoration was completed in 1991.

In the late 1970s he put forward a proposal to acquire the successful John Pinkerton trip- boat operation, which still flourishes today. He presided over the formal opening of the Basingstoke Canal in May 1991 by the Duke of Kent, and was delighted when, last year, the Duke made a second visit to present the society with the Queen's Award for Voluntary Service.

He was widely known among waterway restoration groups as the only chair of the Southern Canals Association, from its inception in 1975 to date. He was made an OBE in 2003.

By trade, Robin owned and ran a family plant nursery business near Woking, and was president of the agricultural and horticultural society in his home village. His wife, Heather, predeceased him.
