# RCR loses offices in fireworks fire

A massive fire at a Staffordshire fireworks company on 30 October gutted the adjacent offices of River Canal Rescue, destroying all stock and membership documents.

RCR Managing Director Stephanie Horton was in the office at the time of the explosions, which blasted outside her front door. She managed to escape and was treated for smoke inhalation.

"Although we've lost everything and our emergency lines are down, our database is up and run-

## **Bits and Pieces**

#### Boat fire claims life

A man died in a canal boat fire on the Kennet and Avon Canal near Marsh Farm, Hilperton, Trowbridge on Tuesday 25 November.

It is thought that the unidentified male was in his late 40s and that his 45ft wide-beam boat was alight for some time. A dog walker called fire services at 7.19am and tried to help rescue the man but it is understood that the windows were too hot to touch.

Fire fighters quickly found the man and removed him from the boat but he was confirmed dead at the scene.

A spokesman for Wiltshire Fire and Rescue Service said the fire is believed to be accidental and the investigation is focusing on the wood burning stove and confirmed that a dog was found dead on the boat.

#### **Boat licence increases**

Following a series of above-inflation rises which had been agreed before the changeover from British Waterways, the Canal and River Trust pledged in 2012 that increases would be pegged back to the retail price index for the following three years. 2015-16 is the second of those three years, and the 1.6 percent rise is based on the retail price index for July 2014.

## From Southampton to Ely in the Fens 1973

Our member Laurie Pearce has sent in the following piece about his experience travelling to the IWA National Rally held at Ely on the River Great Ouse in 1973. Thank you for sharing this Laurie.

At long last the moment had arrived. For weeks beforehand my odd moments had been spent improving the interior of the boat, an 18ft Callum Craft, mainly from the culinary point of view of course, but as far as I was concerned, a means to an end! Extra shelves for foodstuffs, a rack over the cooker for heating plates, or even drying socks, but not I would add at the same time!

We were going to the IWA Rally of Boats at Ely in Cambridgeshire and it was to be included in our two weeks summer holiday. Having never cruised Fenland before, it was a great opportunity to combine the two. We were not quite so ambitious as some of our Society fellow members who were going all the way by water. But in any case, my free weekends are few and far between and also it is not possible to lock up our boat when left in some obscure mooring for a couple of

weeks to fend for itself for the simple reason it has no door!!

We decided to trail 'Bittern' to Oundle on the River Nene and this would mean a trip of 64 miles to Ely. We would have to negotiate about a dozen devilish Nene locks which I am ashamed to say I can muster no enthusiasm for! I should imagine that the bargemen of the Nene would make Charles Atlas look like a seven stone weakling after a trip from the Wash to Northampton winding those guillotine gates up and down. A good job for ex-barrel organ grinders! [Most if not all of the guillotine gates are now wound by electric power - Ed]

We left Southampton at 07.30hrs on Sunday. Amazingly, we were flashing

through Blisworth at 11.00am (the village not the tunnel) with 'Bittern' hanging on grimly on the trailer behind. By noon we had reached Oundle and a few minutes later Oundle Marina where we found every courtesy extended by the proprietors, who hadn't tried to cram as many boats in as possible.

We had heard from Joan and John Read at Braunston (fellow Society members) that they should reach Oundle in their '*Mayfly*' by Sunday mid-day or thereabouts and this we were looking forward to. They were to leave a message for us if they had gone through earlier. However, no Joan and John or message and at 3pm we decided to potter on, leaving a message at the Marina that we would be mooring up about 7pm.

We slid out of the hole in the bank which serves as the entrance and exit for the Marina, turned left and were on our way. Almost at once, we were confronted by a hated Nene lock. I felt like an initiate to canal cruising. Where do I put the key to unlock the mechanism? What type of windlass do I use?

As if by magic, a Thames type slipper stern launch slid gracefully alongside us and the occupants attacked the guillotine gates with great gusto. I hovered in the background and watched points although I did offer to give a few turns on the fixed windlass handle attached to the gates which requires about 150 turns to get the gate down and another 150 turns to get the thing up again. It seemed like 1500 to me!!

An hour later we were still encircling Oundle church spire. It

reminded me of Napton windmill on the Oxford Canal: you can't seem to get rid of it! The Nene twists and turns and the scenery improves as you head down river. It is very easy to take the wrong turning and finish up on some millowner's waterwheel or shoot the rapids of his mill stream! [*The navigable channel is today much easier* to follow now that signs have been erected - Ed]

There seemed to be a great number of churches standing in fields and one wondered where the congregations came from! Fotheringay Church in particular was strikingly beautiful and the low stone bridge with its five arches which crossed the river was equally attractive. Puzzle: which arch do we go through? We must have chosen the right one because we came out the other side alright!

Four hours after leaving Oundle we tied up above Elton Lock, a most picturesque setting, deep water alongside the bank, a beautiful old mill and a lovely summer's evening. A few fishermen passed us, including one who had passed us earlier on and who conveyed his

> feelings about boats without even moving his mouth! Rupert, the dog, leapt ashore and enjoyed all the local smells whilst we prepared a nice cold chicken salad followed by fresh fruit and cream from the home refrigerator that morning. After all, it wouldn't have kept until the next day even in our Osokool cabinet!

Sitting in the cockpit before turning in, a large bat paid us a fleeting visit and swallows were active over the water. A large moth took up residence in the cavity behind the steering wheel and it remains to be seen whether he remains in our company for the entire trip. Sleep came quickly that night and remained with us until 8am next morning. Even Rupert didn't

Next morning, although the weather forecast was not good, it was misty and heralded a hot day. We ignored the weatherman and sure enough we had one of our hottest days! A leisurely preparation of breakfast which made the locals throw their noses in all directions looking for the bacon and egg source, after which we spent every few minutes looking upstream for signs of 'Mayfly'. They arrived at 11am after engine trouble had delayed them.

After greetings all round, we entered Elton Lock and commenced the day's journey. Elton Lock was quite deep and with a foot of water pouring over the top gates, excitement was tense as we raised the guillotine gate. I nearly tore my arms from their sockets trying to hold the boat behind ours from ramming our outboard engine and terminating our journey. The gate raised, we all swept majestically out and headed for the next lock four miles distant.

Many of the locks have mills adjacent, regrettably not now in use, but in most cases still in a reasonable state of preservation. I looked through the broken windows of one at Elton and there were still sacks of grain lying around, mostly with holes in them: a veritable Shangri-la for our rodent population. I saw a dormouse sitting quite happily and then he suddenly disappeared.

We stopped below Wansford Lock by the attractive stone bridge and had a glass of Joan and John's homemade beer and a snack lunch. Then on to Peterborough through some very attractive stretches of

river not unlike some parts of the Thames and through more "unattractive" locks. About two miles before Peterborough, we passed a bout of moorings belonging to the Peterborough Yacht Club. There were all types of craft there including one or two sea-going craft.

Peterborough has constructed a beautiful riverside park along the Nene with plenty of mooring rings. As the moorings are adjacent to the shops, we rushed into the town only to find that the shops closed at 5.30pm. However, a friendly supermarket proprietor re-opened his doors and allowed us to purchase a loaf after hearing my pathetic story about starving boaters! Peterborough would have made an excellent overnight mooring but one has become so used to

## Latest on Dogmersfield Landslip

For many months during 2014, Hampshire County Council officers have been consulting with the landowner of the surrounding land and his representatives on a plan for how the slip will be repaired and the costs divided. The process has been somewhat complex and lengthy because a large portion of the slip is on private land adjoining the canal. However an agreement has now been struck.

The landowner has cleared the off-side bank of the remaining trees and has graded the bank to a shallower slope.

We are pleased to hear that work on the first of a two-phase repair has now commenced, with the adjoining landowner's contractor now hooligans and vandals in these popular places that we decided to move on through Stanground Lock and into the Middle Level for the night.

We turned right off the Nene and were bade wait a while for the lock keeper to have his tea, apparently he had been very busy with boats going to the Rally and the time was now 7.30pm. This lock was guite small and 'Mayfly' and 'Bittern', being first in the small queue which had now formed, were the first through. There was only about 19 inches of water over the cill which caused trouble for quite a number of boats with a deeper draught but we were OK and were soon on our way through the "drains" of the Fens.

This tale will be continued next month, when these intrepid boaters will traverse waterways that are not navigable today.

on site - they will be cutting back the broken towpath and reconstructing the slipped towpath-side slope with free draining material. The second phase, to be undertaken by contractors working for HCC, will provide piled support for the bank on both sides, along with dredging the channel back to its original profile.

As far as we know, the second phase is due to start early in the New Year and is still scheduled for completion by Easter 2015. The towpath will necessarily have to remain closed until all the works are completed. However, the canal remains open to navigation until further notice. A closure until Easter is expected to start in January.
