Memories - The Chairman, Secretary and their boats



To mark the Southampton Canal Society's 50th anniversary, Annemarie Evans, daughter of our President and a journalist/broadcaster based in Hong Kong, has been chatting to some members but would like to talk to more. If you'd like to share some memories and anecdotes, please email Annemarie at: hkhradio3@qmail.com and she'll give you a phone call.

Society chairman Alan Rose's interest in canals started off early in life – not so much the boats on the canals, but what was swimming in them. "I used to go and fish for sticklebacks in The Feeder in Neasden, London. The Feeder ran from the Welsh Harp, which is the Grand Union Feeder Reservoir," he says. "The Feeder ran along the back of my

father's former home in Neasden. I then had my first attempt at sailing on the Welsh Harp [Reservoir] and also launched my first canoe on Boxing Day 1959."

And then he started noticing the bigger craft... "I used to also travel out to Denham on the Grand Union Canal to go fishing. I'd watch the British Waterways boats come flying up to Denham Deep Lock almost hitting the gates. They'd be up off the boats, empty the lock, in, fill and out. It all seemed to only take five minutes!"

Then in 1968, Alan and Angela and two friends hired a Ladyline fibreglass

cruiser from Barbridge Junction on the Middlewich Branch of the Shropshire Union and set off to Llangollen after about "five minutes' instruction".

"Our first major event was just after passing through Hurleston Locks. We got our first ever rope around our prop, which meant I had to go into the cut up to my Plimsoll line."

It was quite an emotional moment for Alan, as he lost one of his flip flops bought earlier in Texas.

"The next mishap was at Wrenbury Lift Bridge where we managed to knock down the windscreen, which meant we then had to visit the hardware shop in Ellesmere to purchase hammer and nails and a screwdriver. Our first renovation job! We have not been back to the Llangollen since."

In 1970, a trip to Macclesfield followed, which was the Rose's first taste of the lengthy lock flight, Heartbreak Hill, on the Trent & Mersey Canal, before they left the canals to go boating on the sea. Twelve years later, "we were given a job to repair a Norman 23 river cruiser that had sunk just before Christmas 1982 in the backwater at Runnymede on the Thames," says Alan. "Before we could start the job the insurance company wrote it off. We were asked whether we would like it, offered them £350 and found ourselves with a boat. After repairing the two holes in the bottom and cleaning out the engine we re-launched it back into the Thames, moved it around to Nicholls boatyard, brought it back to Southampton, refitted it and then thought: What do we do with it now? A friend suggested putting on to the canals."

But after a year, Alan and Angela moved on to bigger, better and decidedly longer things, with the narrow boat, *Liberty*, which was just a boat shell, when they bought her in 1984. They still have *Liberty* at

Napton. She was joined, in 1998, by a shortened Large Northwich working boat called *Purton*, which was originally built in 1936. Alan has been able to track her working history as she's maintained the same name throughout. "She was moored at Sells Green on the Kennet & Avon," says Alan. "We decided to buy her as all she needed was a clean -up and coat of paint. After 19 years we are just finishing the painting!"

Purton was built at W M Yarwoods and Son of Northwich in Cheshire for the Grand Union Canal Carrying Company, London. She was one of 38 built at Northwich, primarily for coal carrying from the Warwickshire Coalfields to London, the Dickinson paper mills at Croxley and Apsley, Kearley and Tonges at Southall, otherwise known as the Jam 'Ole,







where there was a jam factory.

"The Grand Union Canal Carrying Company was based at Bull's Bridge in Southall," says Alan, "that was the main dock area. On the way back, they'd pick up fruit for the HP factories, timber, aluminium, steel, munitions later on."

Alan and Angela have met old crew members of Purton. "One of them was a young girl on Purton, she and her sister lived on Purton in the 1950s. We also have met some of Purton's old skippers, though they've passed away now. Gladys Horne was a wonderful old boat lady, who lived in a lock cottage at Berkhamsted, Tom Sibley was also one of her captains, he lived in the lock cottage down from Gladys."

The Roses enjoy using both boats, says Alan, but there is a special connection to a boat that is more than 80

years old and which plied the canals for decades fully laden. After being taken over by British Waterways, *Purton* was shortened from 72 feet to 60, which still is a large boat to handle.

"When she was launched in 1936," says Alan, "they were due for the coronation [of Edward VIII] and a lot of the boats were painted red, white and blue. Then Edward VIII abdicated but they still kept the red white and blue for George VI's coronation."

Purton is still painted red, white and blue today and last August took the trophy for the best working boat at the IWA Festival of Water. She may be 60 feet, but most of that would have been for coal, leaving the living space of the cabin for Alan and Angela, but they're a fairly seasoned crew after 51 years of marriage.

Sir Frank Price: 1922 - 2017

A former council leader and Lord Mayor who played a major role in the post-war transformation of Birmingham has died at the age of 95.

Sir Frank Price is perhaps most closely associated with the development of the inner and middle ring roads, the original Bull Ring shopping centre, the expansion of council housing and creation of the Midlands Arts Centre - now mac Birmingham - in Cannon Hill Park.

Born in 1922, he was raised in back-to-back slum houses and rose to become Labour council leader, a property developer and knight of the realm. The politician also oversaw the development of Telford as chairman of the project board and was a long-serving chairman of the British Waterways Board.

He had retired to Spain where he died peacefully at Almeria Hospital on December 30 following a battle with Alzheimer's.

Birmingham City historian Professor Carl Chinn paid tribute to Sir Frank.

He said: "Frank Price came from the back streets of Hockley and he never forgot where he came from or the loyalty that he owed to his own people.

"Elected to the council in 1949, he would become one of the most important figures in post-war Birmingham and was knighted in 1966 when he was Lord Mayor.

"For all this honour and others, he remained true to his roots.

"As a politician, Sir Frank was determined to improve life for the working class of the city - not only through redevelopment but also through provisions for culture and leisure."

Sir Frank was raised by his mother Lucy and three brothers in the notorious back-to-backs of inner-city Birmingham where 11 families shared a single outside tap and a single toilet. He was a keen boxer in his teens and left school at 14.

After a brief spell with the Communist Party, he moved to Labour and was elected councillor for St Paul's ward in 1949 at the age of 27.

In 1958, he moved to Kings Norton ward which he represented until 1974.

He was knighted at the age of 46 during the Wilson government and was later commissioned as a Deputy Lieutenant for Worcestershire.

He left local politics in 1974 and became the longest-serving chairman of any nationalised industry, appointed by Barbara Castle and running the British Waterways Board for 16 years.



His contribution, however, was far greater than simply the length of his service, since he shaped an independent navigation authority - for the first time free from any railway interference - and this came at a time when politicians were unwilling to accept such a move.

His tenure was subject to attack from many quarters, including civil servants and trade unionists, and, when he went out of his way to cultivate a good relationship with waterways campaigners, it was inevitable that he was perceived by bureaucracy as being 'the opposition'. However, the IWA regarded him as an effective ally in the battle to save the waterways.

By the time he retired in 1984, he left British Waterways a far stronger and more confident organisation, after consistently standing up for the future of the inland waterways.

Throughout the 1970s he had to grapple with two conflicting problems: a drastic lack of funding which prevented BWB from even maintaining existing facilities let alone carrying out any restoration work; and a powerful lobby aimed at breaking up the navigation authority and devolving its assets and responsibilities to the newly created regional water authorities.

Sir Frank was particularly upset that the government refused to accept the reports of BWB's own staff in assessing the work to deal with the rapidly deteriorating historic canal structures. Instead, they wasted time by employing consultants, then failing to act on their recommendations, until the point was reached in the late 1970s when the network was decimated by tunnel closures.

He was also deeply committed to the development of freight transport on the canals, and exerted considerable personal energy in meeting with European leaders and British businessmen to promote his ideas. In particular, he created BACAT, a scheme of roll-on, roll-off barges within ships that could cross the North Sea. Sir Frank, a lifetime supporter of Labour, nevertheless met violent opposition from the dockers, who eventually stopped the scheme.

Sir Frank divorced in his 50s and retired to live in Mojacar, south-east Spain, in his late 60s.

He leaves his ex-wife Maisie and only son Noel, who said: "He was a charming, funny, hardworking and generous man, a socialist to his last breath and loved dearly by all.

"I was proud to be his best friend as well as his only child."
