The Itchen Navigation Project

Following the recent Heritage Lottery grant for this project, the Project Team have a busy schedule for the coming year including the following plans:

- A project launch is planned for the summer to kick off the project and increase community awareness and involvement.
- A school competition will be run to design an eye catching logo for the project, which will be used on a new leaflet and new website which are also planned for this year.
- River engineering will be carried out at Allbrook and Brambridge to stabilise eroding banks and reduce leaks from the Navigation.
- Carefully planned tree works will take place at Shawford, Otterbourne and Bishopstoke. The purpose is to make the Navigation less shaded, making the areas a better place for wildlife, and also in preparation for future work such as path improvements and bank stabilisation works.
- Species monitoring surveys of bats, otters, watervoles, birds, dragonflies, damselflies and butterflies.
- Habitat enhancement at Mansbridge. This much neglected part of the Navigation will be revitalised with the help of volunteers.
- Lock preservation work at Mansbridge Lock and Brambridge Hatch will be carried out by volunteers under the supervision of the Inland Waterway Association.

Volunteer Opportunities:

There are a number of opportunities for which we are seeking the aid of volunteers. If you're interested in any of the tasks listed below, get in touch with Polly Whyte (contact details below). Volunteer involvement is a vital part of the project so it's hoped there is a task here that appeals to you.

Species Surveys:

Water vole and otter surveys: monitoring their distribution and recording bank vegetation on stretches of the Navigation.

Bat Surveys: emergence surveys using bat detectors. **Bird Surveys**: experienced birders required for monitoring the distribution of birds at specified sites.

Dragonfly, damselfly and butterfly surveys: recording the presence of different species from the bank of the Navigation.

Practical Conservation:

Lock preservation including some vegetation clearance, re-pointing and brick work.

Habitat enhancement which includes scrub management and litter clearance.

Publicity:

Can you take a good photo? A **photographer** is needed to capture a photographic record of the project and the people involved. Required one day per month.

Website Editor: to update and maintain the project website.

Public Transport Guide Editor: researching bus and train timetables and publishing on the web.

Newsletter Editor: to put articles and information for the quarterly Itchen Navigation Newsletter.

Events Assistant: helping with the coordination of key events throughout the year, including publicising the event and support with running it.

Finally, we are also looking for a **Heritage Researcher** to bring together details of the Itchen's industrial heritage including text, photos and artwork.

April Meeting Steve Haywood – "Fruit Flies Like a Banana"

Having read his book "Fruit Flies Like A Banana", I was delighted to welcome Steve Haywood to our April meeting.

Steve is an award-winning TV producer, journalist and author. He worked on a number of current affairs programmes, including Newsnight, Panorama and the award-winning series 'Rough Justice'. In 1990 he formed Just Television Ltd and, in 1999, he won a Royal Television Society award for investigative journalism. The following year, after the publication of his first novel, he left the industry to pursue a career as a writer. Steve will, perhaps, be best known to our members for his monthly column in the "Canal Boat" magazine.

He introduced himself and his talk by telling us 'there will be no holiday slides tonight, you will just have to listen to me' which we all did, avidly. Apart from canals his other interest was football. He supports Leicester City and therefore enjoyed visiting Southampton, who were having similar problems.

Steve told us he had always been obsessed with canals, he had been a boat owner for more than 30 years; his narrow boat is called 'Justice'. He described his early adventures at Barrow on the River Soar – swimming in the lock and throwing bricks at passing boats – and being told off by his Mum.

It was Steve's 50th birthday that spurred him into action. As he explained that 'What men do, when they hit 50, is cycle around the world, or go to the Amazon – but, not me. I made a trip from Oxford to Bristol by narrow boat and in a classic Triumph Herald car'. Therein lays the premise of his book "Fruit Flies Like A Banana' – an account of the journey he took through the nation's waterways in 2000.

He referred to his first hire boat experience and he quoted from excerpts of the old (Northern) Nicholson Guide, concerning likely problems to be encountered, including very shallow canals and the risks of running aground, making sure one didn't run out of fuel because of the infrequency of convenient re-fuelling points, and emptying the toilet. He went on to compare the differences between canals of, say, 30 years ago and now: made up towing paths, cyclists, joggers, and fishermen with all their tackle. He recollected about the early hire companies with their converted pontoons and ships' lifeboats and cut down working boats.

After the interval Steve had a rant against British Waterways (something he is well known for) and its ever-increasing regulations. He was obviously unhappy about the increasing number of boats on the waterways and the growth in marina development.

We heard of his spooky experience of a ghost on Pontcysyllte Aqueduct.

He was looking forward to 2044(!!!) – the 100th anniversary of Tom Rolt's "Narrow Boat" – which had started it all.

During the evening Steve sold signed copies of "Fruit Flies Like A Banana" – at a specially reduced price. Steve has another book, due to be published later this year – "Narrow Boat Dreams".

Many thanks Steve for taking the time to visit us and for such an entertaining and humorous talk.

When they heard that we had chartered the boat they wanted to come along and share in our trip.



Our outward cruise took us through the electrically operated North Warnborough Lift Bridge to Odiham Castle where we disembarked and the boat was winded. Whilst some members explored the recently 'restored' King John's Castle', others walked beyond the (current) head of navigation to view the entrance portal to Greywell Tunnel. Then
