BLAKE'S LOCK MUSEUM. Situated on the banks of the River Kennet, the Museum is housed in a range of buildings which are themselves superb examples of Victorian industrial architecture and Reading's decorative brickwork. These were originally part of a pumping station built at Blake's Weir in the 1870s. The life and times of Reading in the 19th and early 20th centuries are captured through numerous early photographs and a wealth of exhibits.

There are reconstructions of a printer's workshop (Parnell's of London Street), a bakery (Huggins of Crown Street) and a gentlemen's hairdresser (Pottinger's of Whitley Street). Local brickmaking, iron founding, Cock's famous Reading Sauce, mineral water manufacturers, Reading photographers, ironmongers, pharmacies, confectioners, fancy goods and toy bazaars, shoemakers

and menders and dairies are all included in a wide variety of displays.

The waterways display covers Reading's close links with the rivers Thames and Kennet, and the Kennet and Avon Canal. It shows aspects of the town's commercial life, the once thriving mills and wharves, and the boat building and fishing industries. Navigation introduces the rivers' locks, weirs, ferries and bridges. Recreation on the river is vividley portrayed in its heyday of pleasure boats, regattas and the popular pastime of angling.

A major feature of the Museum is a traditional gypsy ledge caravan, by the famous makers Dunton and Sons of Reading. Built about 1910, this particularly ornate caravan has been restored to its original colour scheme with rich

decorative gilding.

A temporary exhibition area features a varied programme of displays relating to Reading's waterways, trades and industries and other features of the Town's life in the past.

HISTORIC MAP. A marvellous new large folding map, covering all the navigations of England and Wales, even those authorised but not built, can be used to chart the phenomenal growth of the canal system during Canal Mania, two centuries ago.

Different types of navigation are distinguished, with opening dates, along with major structures, such as lock flights, tunnels and lifts. The only compilation of its kind, this map should remain an essential reference work for many years to come.

Some years ago, the early sixties to be exact, we used to visit friends in Harrow, Middlesex for the occasional weekend. On one summer Sunday in 1963, our friends suggested a visit to a canalside pub, which turned out to be the one at the Three Locks, Soulbury, on the Grand Union. When I saw the lovely old canal bridge (no longer there!) and the old lock beams etc. I was taken back in time and wanted to know more about our canal inheritance. The landlord of the pub told me of that winter freeze up when all the working boats were frozen in for nearly three months, and as a result, the canal carrying trade was dealt a death blow. I obtained all the canal literature I could, joined the Kennet and Avon Canal Trust and the IWA, and the same year hired a British Waterways boat called 'Water Lupin' from Juxon Street Wharf in Oxford. I persuaded my parents to join us, and in spite of much inclement weather, we thoroughly enjoyed it and repeated the holiday the following year to Llangollen in a boat from Inland Hire Cruisers at Christleton near Chester. The rest is history and my ambition to have a narrowboat moored at the bottom of my garden

NEW BOOKS IN THE LIBRARY.

1. 'Inland Waterways of Great Britain' - 2nd Edition - June 1947.

Compiled by W. Eric Wilson, D.S.O. Presented to SCS by Gerald Davies of the Surrey and Hants Canal Society.

This book is the forerunner of Imray's 'Inland Waterways of Great Britain

and Ireland' and is a list of Canals and Rivers with their details.

There are some interesting prices quoted - eg. At certain places on the Norfolk Broads 'For mooring along the banks and elsewhere, a charge from 1/- to 2/6 per night may be nmade.'

2. 'Thames Waters' by Roger Pilkington. Presented to SCS library by Gordon

Sennett of Romsey.

3. 'Britains Inland Waterways' by Roger Wickson (1968). Presented to our library by Laurie Pearce. This book is a good introduction to Britain's Canal system.

BOAT TRIPS. If anyone is contemplating a boat trip aboard 'John Pinkerton' on the Basingstoke Canal or on the Kennet and Avon Canal from either Newbury or Kintbury the Society has brochures for both.

A MILLION TO ONE, - OR MORE? It is rare for me to be in the right place at the right time but for once....

While staying a weekend in Buckingham we went for a walk to Wolverton Aqueduct which carries the Grand Union Canal over the River Ouse in a metal trough.

The chances of seeing a pair of working narrow boats these days are slim, but arriving at the Canal for the first time in about 20 years and a pair passing within 30 seconds of us getting there is probably many millions to one.

Chucking my camera bag on the grass I quickly took a couple of shots as the boats crossed Wolverton Aqueduct, then pushing Angina aside, raced to the

top of the embankment to take more.

We then passed through the accommodation tunnel and hurried after them to Cosgrove Lock. There they were held for a minute or two while another boat went on ahead, so we were able to catch up and take a whole sequence of photos while they were worked through the lock. (Now the worry - hope I set the camera correctly, didn't shake etc., hope the film is OK.)

Speaking to the boatmen we learned that the boats were travelling back to Stoke Bruerne from Leighton Buzzard where they had been used as overnight accommodation for rugby club members who had wanted to celebrate the last match of the season and had feared that they would not be fit to drive home the same

evening.

The narrow boats will soon be going to Birmingham to pick up a load of baled waste paper to be transported down the Grand Union Canal to Dickinson's paper mills for recycling. It appears that Birmingham Corporation are keen to use the Canals when they can but this traffic only becomes economical when volunteer crews man the boats.

On arriving back at Buckingham I found that I had a spectacles case with no specs inside it. "I'll bet you dropped them down when you took the first photo Dad, and then scrambled off without them."

So back to Cosgrave and walked to the exact spot. There were my specs on the grass just a yard from the path. Luckily no one had stepped on them.

There were comments such as "It's surprising what a couple of narrow boats

can do to an old chap."
