Helping rare butterflies

The Warwickshire branch of the Butterfly Conservation Society have decided to improve the habitat for rare butterflies in Fenny Compton by adopting a stretch of the Oxford Canal

The group of butterfly enthusiasts is keen to transform a stretch of the Oxford Canal to increase the numbers of butterflies in the area such as the Grizzled Skipper, Small Blue and the Dingy Skipper. Set up in early August, the group will be cutting back over-grown vegetation to encourage certain butterfly friendly plants to grow and creating a 'butterfly bund' covered in colourful plants which offer egg laying opportunities.

Claverton Pumping Station

Volunteers are needed to get the historic pumping station at Claverton, near Bath, ready for action, as plans are revealed to install a visitor car park before summer next year.

While there's a dedicated group of volunteers working on restoring the mechanism of the pump itself, more are needed to help spruce up the surrounding gardens and picnic area.



Conserving Water And Lock Flight Closures On The Basingstoke

For the last two years it was, unusually, possible for the Basingstoke to remain open to navigation along its entire length throughout the season. The principal reason for this was particularly heavy rainfall during the autumn of 2012 and winter of 2014. I say unusually, because 2013 was only the second season that the canal had not been closed to boats sometime during the Summer since completion of its restoration over 20 years previously.

However, with the relatively dry summers last year and this, and modest rainfall over the last winter and spring, it has not been possible to avert closure of the canal this year. The Deepcut and Brookwood flights were closed temporarily on 20th July, after which a brief storm offered a short reprieve (see graph, below), but then the closures had to be applied again on 7th August and will remain in force until there is further significant rain.




The progressive dropping level of water has also necessitated placing restrictions on the movements of the Society trip boat, the *John Pinkerton*. Recent trips to the King John's Castle have had to be limited to small parties only, because of the risk of getting stuck in the cut at Swan bridge. Further, the August Bank Holiday public trips usually undertaken from the Fox and Hounds in Fleet have unfortunately had to be relocated back to Odiham (because of the narrowed section past the Dogmersfield land slip is currently impassable to the JP).

But why does this happen?

The answer is quite simple: the Basingstoke does not have any major source of water at its summit, for example a reservoir, or connected river (like the nearby Kennet & Avon Canal and Wey Navigation), so it has no capacity to store winter rainfall. It is instead dependent on springs in Hampshire (including those in the Greywell Tunnel and at Broad Oak) and minor supplies and run-off along its length. As the weather gets warmer and rainfall levels drop, these supplies begin to wane and increasingly cannot keep up with the losses that arise from general leakage, evaporation and transpiration (by trees and other vegetation). Boat movements through locks make the situation worse of course. For example, the Broad Oak stream, normally supplying about 2m litres/day, has been dry since mid-July.

The critical importance of water conservation on the Basingstoke is illustrated in a comparison with flows of other local waterways (see right). Even taking into account all the sources along its length, and backpumping (ie, water recycling) in Woking, the amount of water available to the Basingstoke is still around 50 to 100 times smaller than that supplying



the K&A (as measured in Reading). You may see lock gates leaking a lot of water on these other canals but to a large extent it does not matter because they have substantial feeds. However on the Basingstoke this just cannot be allowed to happen.

Conserving Water

It is no wonder then that the canal authority lock-keepers spend a lot of time during dry conditions ensuring that avoidable losses from the canal are minimised, in particular, ensuring paddles are secure, and caulking up the upper lock gates (ie plugging with fibre such as sawdust) after locks have been used to reduce leaks.

These actions help prevent loss of water from one pound to another, which is vital for those short pounds, for example at Deepcut and Brookwood, where if they were allowed to empty could take a while to refill in dry conditions, during which time the canal would have to be closed.

The BCA have a policy for requesting that locks are emptied after use. This may seem counter-intuitive, but it not only reduces the amount of leakage through the lock structures, which have varying states of water-tightness, but also allows lock-keepers to check that the upper gates have been properly sealed.

BCA staff and canal lengthsmen are also constantly on the lookout for leaks, particularly through embankments. One was found only recently near Dogmersfield, which may have accounted for a more rapid than expected drop in the Hampshire pound during July. Luckily it could be fixed promptly. We ask that all users of the canal keep their eyes open for unusually wet areas and report any concerns to the Canal Centre.

When the water drops below a certain level, the BCA has to take action, initially to limit boat access through Ash Lock to ranger working hours (so it can be caulked) to preserve water in the Hampshire pound – this usually occurs at around -150mm (ie 6" below datum). If it drops further, to around -200mm/8", then with the restricted flow from Hampshire there is insufficient water available to operate the Deepcut and Brookwood flights and so these are closed, which is the position at the time of writing. (Navigation can still continue at the Woking end since the back-pumping facilities are switched on to return water to the top of the Woodham and St John's flights after use.)

A further measure to save on water, which is in its third year of operation, is to restrict locking on the canal to particular days of the

week. This has proved controversial with some boaters, who cannot just "turn up and go" on the Basingstoke but have to plan ahead. However, adopting this policy allows water levels to recover during the intervening days.

The Future

A project has been running for a while to identify possible additional sources of water for the Basingstoke Canal. As yet, no substantial discoveries have been made. Even so, the methods for managing low water levels described above will need to continue into the future.

However, a <u>system for remote water levels</u> <u>measurement and to control pumps</u> is in the process of being installed and is already yielding results. This scheme, the first to be implemented in the UK, will make the process easier for the BCA rangers who will be able to monitor the state of the canal from their mobile phones. We will report on this further in due course.

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Update on pawl catch feedback

IN JUNE, the Canal & River Trust requested boater feedback on the issue of the risk of injury to boaters from uncontrolled windlasses caused by paddles dropping quickly, and the potential for modifications to pawl catches. The Trust is now providing an update to boaters on progress.

The Trust has stopped rolling out changes to pawls following feedback from around 100 boaters, as well as from its Navigation Advisory Group and the Inland Waterways Association. The charity will work together with the IWA and NAG on any future proposals, to gain valuable insight from experienced boaters.

Concerns were raised in consultation responses that the new catches may interfere with the ability to drop paddles quickly if a boat becomes hung-up in a lock. It has also been commented that a design, which requires the pawl catch to be held up by one hand, could create difficulties where paddles are stiff and require both hands to operate. Children and the frail may also struggle to wind down paddles one-handed.

Trials and information gathering across the network will be conducted towards the end of 2015 to evaluate the forces required to operate paddles. The Trust intends to then review the data and consult further with boaters to develop any future plans for pawl modifications, or giving boaters the information they need to operate safely through communication and education. In the meantime, the Trust will continue to replace worn or faulty spindles.

Revamped towpath in Devizes

A project on the Kennet & Avon Canal at Devizes, carried out in partnership between the Canal & River Trust and Wiltshire Council, has seen a 700 metre stretch improved at a cost of £225,000 from London Road to Cemetery Bridge to provide people an ideal alternative to the busy main roads nearby.

The new path will be suitable for use in all weathers and is the first phase of three in a proposed project to improve towpath surfaces alongside the popular 200-year old canal, providing a green, traffic-free route through the heart of the town.

New Surrey canal bridge takes shape

The new bridge that will enable part of the Wey and Arun Canal in Surrey to be fully opened to boats for the first time in more than 150 years is taking shape.

Contractors CJ Thorne are making good progress on forming the basic reinforced concrete structure of the bridge, building on the piling installed last month. The new crossing of the waterway is in Compasses Lane, Alfold, at one of the entrances to the Dunsfold Aerodrome complex.

It will replace a Second World War concrete causeway which is the main obstacle to navigation on one-and-a-quarter miles of the canal.

The waterway has already been largely de-silted and re-profiled between Tickner's Heath in Dunsfold and Fast Bridge on the A281 at Alfold.

Work on the basic structure of the bridge is expected to take about six months. It is being done with the co-operation of aerodrome

owners Dunsfold Park and local landowners.

The Trust has so far raised £433,317 towards the £700,000 cost of the project, mainly through donations and legacies. Contributions to our appeal will be gratefully received – please see the Donate Now section on the Home Page.

It is aimed to officially re-open the canal section – the Wey & Arun's Summit Level – in the autumn of 2016. This will coincide with the 200th anniversary of the official opening of the Wey & Arun Junction Canal, the northern section of the waterway, at the Compasses site.

Our Compasses project also incorporates a public viewing platform and an accessible footpath to a boat landing stage, which will be a community and educational facilities. The area around the bridge will be landscaped and a wildflower meadow planted.
