PIPING ABOARD

Three traditional working boats, *Saltaire*, *Dane* and its butty, *Ditton* completed a journey of 236 miles and 152 locks recently to deliver a cargo of pipes to the Kennet & Avon Canal. Starting on the Erewash Canal, the delivery completes the final stage in laying the pipes under the towpath for the back pumping scheme on the Caen Hill Lock flight, Devizes. 30 pipes in total arrived, each measuring over 2ft in diameter, about 21ft long and weighing approx 1 tonne. The delivery was arranged by BW, the Historic Narrowboat Owners Club and the Commercial Narrowboat Operators Association.

NEW TUG

A new electrically powered tug has been launched to tow boats through Dudley Tunnel. At a special ceremony Iris Brown named the boat *John C Brown* in honour of her late husband. John led the canal-focused redevelopment of Birmingham and the Black Country throughout the 1960s, 70s and 80s as British Waterways' Area Engineer, Birmingham and Special Projects Engineer.

The new tug features a special hull designed by British Waterways engineers. The tug will be managed by the Dudley Canal Trust and will allow pre-booked boats to be towed through the tunnel from September.

ANDERTON UPDATE

There was great excitement last October when the Anderton Boat Lift Trust was launched - but it's all been a bit quiet since. Or so it would seem - but no! Work has been continuing behind the scenes, mainly to determine the scale of works involved in restoring the Lift. BW are playing an active part as members of the Trust in making financial proposals for restoration.

The feasibility stage has now been completed by Lewin & Fryer, consulting engineers, in preparation for the design stages. Extensive testing of the structure is being carried out and assessments are being made of what parts of the Lift to retain, replace and the scope of the necessary restoration. Besides the intense engineering investigations, visitor access is being improved by the provision of AA signing and the re-establishment of a formal viewing area.

RUBBISH - WHAT A WASTE!

Westminster City Council have decided to transfer the removal of waste from water transport to road by awarding the contract for the removal of rubbish to Onyx UK who will be using up to 50 lorries a day to move that which currently being moved via the River Thames. The Chairman of IWA's Inland Shipping Group is angry at the way the decision has been handled. It was published in the *London Evening Standard* the day before the contracts committee met. Also the closure of Grosvenor Dock and the disposal of the tugs was announced before the official decision on the waste disposal contract.

The council's switch from water to road is opposed to professed government policy. The IWA, London Rivers Association and the Port of London Authority have all protested at the decision and it is estimated that the jobs of 30 lightermen will be at risk because of the transfer.

In contrast, a week later the Corporation of London agreed a deal with Cory Environmental to dispose of its 50,000 tonnes of rubbish a year with a condition that the waste continues to be taken away by water.

MONTGOMERY CANAL

On Saturday June 3rd, the first 1½ miles from Frankton Junction via the new Graham Palmer Memorial Lock to the site of the Perry Aqueduct were officially opened. I recently had the chance to visit this beautiful canal and whilst the new works still look brash, nature will soon mellow the hand of man. It is also good to see work under way, both volunteer and professional, at a number of other sites along the waterway. Major reconstruction immediately south of the reopened length including a new road bridge is in hand, as is lock reconstruction at Aston and at Belan. A new bridge under an A road at Welshpool has just been opened. Other assorted work along the canal gives, at long last, every indication of a very active restoration which should the whole canal open within a decade. *Peter Oates*
